

PROPER FIT:

- Shoulder belt lies snugly across the shoulder and chest, not crossing the neck or face
- The lap belt lies snugly across the upper thighs, not the stomach

What are proper restraints?

One of the safest choices drivers and passengers can make is to buckle up. Understand the potentially fatal consequences of not wearing a seat beltand learn what you can do to make sure you and your family are properly restrained every time.

In addition to preventing drivers and passengers from being ejected during a crash, proper restraints reduce the risk of collision with the steering wheel, dashboard, windshield, or other passengers.

Adults – seat belts

Seat belts are the best defense against impaired, aggressive, and distracted drivers. Being buckled up during a crash helps keep you safe and secure inside your vehicle. The top things you should know:

- Buckling up is the single most effective thing you can do to protect yourself in a crash
- Air bags are designed to work with seat belts, not replace them
- Follow guidelines for proper use never put the shoulder belt behind your back or under your arm
- Fit matters adjust the seat, use adjusters or extenders, if necessary

Lap and shoulder belts prevent ejection from the vehicle and keep people from colliding with the vehicle interior during a crash. They are also designed to manage forces on the body.


NHTSA Traffic Safety Use of Seat Belts Trends



What are proper restraints?

Child Passenger Safety

Motor vehicle injuries are a leading cause of death among children in the U.S. But many of these deaths can be prevented. Always buckling children in age-and size-appropriate car seats, booster seats, and seat belts reduces serious and fatal injuries by up to 80%.





Birth until age 2-4

Buckle children in a rear-facing car seat until they reach the maximum weight or height limit of their car seat. Keep children rear-facing as long as possible.

BOOSTER SEAT



After outgrowing forwardfacing seat and until seat belts fit properly

Once children outgrow their forward-facing seat, they should be buckled in a booster seat until seat belts fit properly. Proper seat belt fit usually occurs when children are 4 feet 9 inches tall and age 9-12.

FORWARD-FACING CAR SEAT



After outgrowing rearfacing seat until at least age 5

When children outgrow their rear-facing car seat, they should be buckled in a forward-facing car seat until they reach the maximum weight or height limit of their car seat.

SEAT BELT



Once seat belts fit properly without a booster seat

Children no longer need to use a booster seat once seat belts fit them properly. Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs (not the stomach) and the shoulder belt lays across the chest (not the neck).

What are proper restraints?

Seat Belt Safety for Tweens

The time to transition your child out of a booster seat and into a seat belt usually comes when the child is between 8 and 12 years old. Keep your children in booster seats until they outgrow the size limits of the booster seats or are big enough to fit properly in seat belts.



Fitting a Child Correctly In a Seat Belt:


For your child to properly fit in a seat belt, he or she must be tall enough to sit without slouching and be able to:

- Keep his/her back against the vehicle
- Keep his/her knees naturally bent over the edge of the vehicle seat
- Keep his/her feet flat on the floor

How Big of a Danger is it?

For car safety, tweens is the time a younger person is between needing to use seat belt positioners and becoming a driver. Typically that range can be age **9 or 10 to 15**.

- 48.3% of kids that were killed in traffic crashes were between the ages of 8 and 15 in 2015
- 39% of children killed in fatal crashes in 2015 were not buckled
- 37% of 8-15 year-olds were in the front seat when killed in a crash


